19. A form of slavery, introduced by Europeans, in which the enslaved person is treated as a piece of property belonging to his or her owner and has no rights; this status is for life and their children automatically have the same status; chattel derives from the word for cattle
20. A term used instead of "illegal" immigrant to describe someone without the proper documentation to prove they have permission to live in that country
